

Two Iowa athletes died too soon:

Twenty-four year old **Derrick Mitchell Jr.** died October 4, 2019 in a fatal car accident in St. Louis. Mitchell played Iowa football from 2013-2016. The running back was from St. Louis Missouri. A second Iowa running back **Damon Bullock** also died of a car accident this year in Duncanville, Texas. He played for Iowa from 2011-2014. Bullock was twen-ty-five years old when he died on March 3, 2019.

Marlin Kirby (1987), a graduate of the Iowa's College of Law & member of the Black Law Students Association passed on July 21st. He received his B.S. at Drake University, where he pledged Alpha Phi Alpha(Alpha Nu Chapter). Services were held at Cage Memorial Chapel in Chicago, Illinois.





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Top African American Administrators Leave Iowa

UI Vice President for Student Life **Melissa Shivers** is leaving Iowa after two-and-a-half years. Shivers has accepted a similar position at Ohio State University. Choosing to become Vice President for Student Life in Columbus, Oh Shivers explained that she was not planning to leave, but after they approached her several times she had to consider the opportunity. During her tenure at Iowa, Shivers focused on making sure that everyone on the Iowa campus felt safe and supported. She demonstrated a deep committment to improving student life and she believed in comunity service and civic engagement.

Tajuan Wilson served as the Associate Vice President for Diversity, Equity and Inclusion at Iowa for less than two months. Wilson moved to Iowa from The Medical University of South Carolina where he was Executive Director of Student Programs and Diversity. Concerning his brief tenure at Iowa it is not clear what happened, but the UI has completed a separation agreement which allows Wilson to keep his \$224,000 salary for six months while he searches for other employment. In the agreement Wilson waved his rights to take legal action against the university and it is not an admission of liability or wrong doing by the university.

Executive Vice President and Provost Montse Fuentes sent a letter campus-wide saying that the UI remains committed to the implementation of an effective diversity, equity and inclusion action plan.

Prominent University of Iowa Black Alumni...

Frederick W. "Duke" Slater was the University's first African American All-America football player and was named to the Chicago Tribune's All-American football team, 1921. Slater Residence Hall is named after him.

Homer Harris became the university's first African American football team captain (a first in Big Ten history) in 1937.

Elizabeth Catlett, a notable sculptor and civil rights advocate, was one of the first students to earn an MFA from Iowa in 1940.

Iowa PhD recipient Jewel Limar Prestage was the first black woman to receive a doctorate in political science from an American university, specifically the UI in 1954.

Donald W. Tucker attended Iowa on a football scholarship. He graduated with a B.A. in sociology and criminology in 1961, and went on to become one of the nation's first black federal narcotics agents. He was also one of the nation's first black Secret Service agents in 1965. He has since written two books: a mystery and a biography.

Margaret Walker Alexander is a noted African American poet and activist. She completed her doctoral dissertation at the University of Iowa in 1965. It was later published as a Civil War novel titled *Jubilee*.

Philip G. Hubbard, who received a Ph.D. from Iowa in 1954 was the first African American vice president at a Big Ten university when he is promoted to Vice President for Student Services and Dean of Academic Affairs at Iowa in 1966.
